



CENTRE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

For almost 30 years, we have been united by our mission – to improve the quality of life of all children in Wales living with cerebral palsy.

We aim to maintain our course and mission despite the buffeting from challenging events around us. In 2021-22 we continued to face the effects of the pandemic, experiencing the gradual transition away from some of the restrictions and the challenge of building back new therapy models that could be flexible to conditions.

In 2021/22, we provided 1,203 specialist therapy sessions to 331 children and their families across Wales. It is estimated that, on average, every five days a baby will be born in Wales who will have cerebral palsy. Last year, 63 new babies were referred to our specialist early intervention service 'Better Start, Better Future.'

We know that children with disabilities and their families have been disproportionately affected by the pandemic and multiple lockdowns, making our services more important than ever.

It has been particularly challenging for families whose children were born during the pandemic and diagnosed as being at risk of cerebral palsy. We moved into our new centre in April 2021 which gave us the space we needed to deliver our services safely. At the same time we launched our appeal for phase two of the building works to add some of the facilities we had taken out of the original plan due to some of the rising costs. We were thrilled to complete this within the year.

It was a highlight on the 24th September 2021 when we were able to welcome supporters to our first 'in-person' event since the beginning of the pandemic, our 'Sparkling Afternoon Tea.'

It continues to be a challenging environment for fundraising as emergency grant funding comes to an end, and at the same time we are not yet seeing some of our previous income streams return to pre-covid levels.

During the pandemic our important work on the Cerebral Palsy Register for Wales was slowed as some of our partners needed to focus resources on other projects, such as the information system for the vaccination programme. We did however work on other aspects of the register as this work is so important in being able to drive change for people in Wales living with cerebral palsy in the longer term.

We have the most fantastic team at Cerebral Palsy Cymru and it is their dedication, energy, skill and enthusiasm that has allowed us to achieve all we have this year. A huge thanks goes to them and also to the board of trustees who support us, and importantly the fantastic community therapy teams we work with to ensure children and families get the best service possible.

I would also like to say a personal thanks to our supporters who have helped us through this difficult time

This year has been one of establishing a 'new normal' as we have continued to find a rhythm of working with families and children post the COVID-19 pandemic.

We are continuing to offer both virtual and face to face appointments to families depending on what is felt to be the best for them. For many families, virtual appointments make our therapy more accessible. They have allowed us to work with families to find practical and realistic solutions to implementing therapy suggestions in their own homes. Many of our colleagues in the NHS are now continuing to join our clinical sessions virtually, whether the family are with us for a face-to-face appointment or attending a virtual session.

Our new large and versatile therapy rooms have been well utilised since we moved into our new home in April 2021.

In addition to the 1.203 therapy sessions our therapy team delivered, the new space has enabled us to run several exciting group activities during the past year. These have included two projects kindly funded by BBC Children in Need; ESCAPADES!, a group for young people exploring communication and social experiences with an emphasis on sensory motor opportunities and Jungle Explorers a group for children in the early years of primary school who have unilateral cerebral palsy as well as an Independent Living Skills group for young people wanting to develop skills that will lead towards being more independent in their self-care, home and community skills.

Over the course of the year, we have continued to receive an increasing number of referrals for babies and parents who are seeking early intervention for their children

Our focus at Cerebral Palsy Cymru is very much on early intervention. Research shows that the earlier a child who has, or is at risk of having cerebral palsy receives specialist therapy, the greater the impact on the child's future outcomes. Because of this, the majority of our resources go towards the treatment of babies aged from birth to two years old through our early intervention service, Better Start, Better Future. We then see children a year later when they are three.

Where resources allow, we see older children up to the age of eighteen.

PROVIDING LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES FOR THERAPISTS AND OTHER PROFESSIONALS

As a national centre of excellence, we have developed our therapy skills to benefit children and families across Wales. We acknowledge our responsibility to share our specialist knowledge and skills with community therapists, so that even more children will benefit from excellent therapy. Part of our vision is therefore to be a training resource for therapists across Wales and beyond.



This year we have achieved this by hosting a number of training courses. The national lockdowns meant that we had to quickly adjust our teaching methods and as a result most of our training was delivered virtually, which was a new venture for us and those attending the courses.

We delivered a total of 9 courses for occupational therapists, speech & language therapists, physiotherapists and therapy assistants across Wales. This new virtual approach proved extraordinarily successful, and our courses were attended by a far greater number of people than we could have previously accommodated in person. Moving forward, we plan on adopting a hybrid approach to delivering training courses and have plans to develop this area of our work further in the coming year.

ENSURING FAMILIES ARE AT THE HEART OF OUR ORGANISATION

Having a child who has cerebral palsy affects the whole family. We want to make sure that our families feel supported and empowered so that they can help their child in the best way possible.

During the year, 63 babies were referred to our early intervention service, Better Start, Better Future. Referrals to this specialist service are coordinated by our family support coordinator, Glenys Evans, who gets to know each family and their child to find out what sort of support they may need.

Glenys facilitated 126 1:1 family support sessions across the year, the majority of which were with families and babies under the age of 2 years. Having a baby who has had a difficult start in life and who may not be developing as expected can impact the whole family, so providing our families with practical advice and emotional support right from the start, is a key part of our service.



We were really pleased that our Better Start Together playgroup, which is led by Glenys and our specialist therapists, was able to recommence this year. These monthly playgroups are a great opportunity for our families to meet other families and babies in a similar situation to them, reducing the sense of isolation that they often feel.

THE IMPACT OF 'BETTER START, BETTER FUTURE' - BEN'S STORY

"I first got in touch with Cerebral Palsy Cymru when Ben was around 6 months old. Glenys, their lovely Family Support Coordinator, spoke to me for almost an hour initially finding out more about Ben and our family. We felt supported straight away and I didn't hesitate when Glenys offered us the opportunity to attend some therapy sessions.

During our first session, we spent 2 hours with two of the therapists. What I remember most was the kind and patient approach that the therapy team had, as well as the gentle and individual therapy they suggested for Ben. After chatting with us as a family and watching us interact with Ben, they were able to suggest exercises that would work with what we were currently doing at home already.

This was so enlightening for us as it didn't feel like 'therapy,' it was just small adaptations to our normal routine with Ben.

The playgroup sessions at Cerebral Palsy Cymru have also become an integral part of Ben's early life. It has been wonderfully reassuring to meet other parents who have had little ones born with some of the same challenges as Ben. It's so nice to see babies and toddlers who have come on a similar journey, and seeing them so happy and calm, is a huge comfort. Caring for a baby born early like Ben can feel extremely lonely at times, but at the Better Start Together playgroups, we don't feel so alone."

It was an exciting start to the year as we were handed the keys to our new children's centre! We had several 'firsts' this year with our first 'Cake & Tea for CP' month in May, our first in-person fundraising event after a 20-month gap, and our first venture into the world of Facebook Fundraising Challenges in the form of our '3000 Star Jumps in November' challenge.

Throughout the year, digital fundraising continued to be a growing source of income for us when, following on from the success of our inaugural Facebook Fundraising Challenge, we held a second Facebook Fundraising Challenge in the form of our '70K Your Way' challenge in March.'

Cerebral Palsy Awareness Month also took place in March this year, as opposed to October, for the first time, to fall in line with other cerebral palsy charities raising awareness around the world. We continued to enjoy some great corporate partnerships throughout the year, our long-standing relationships with Mowgli Street Food Cardiff and Slater & Gordon as well as being charity of the year for the Royal Mint and St Joseph's Hospital, to name just a few.

Towards the end of the year, we were delighted to launch a new partnership with the National Trust Cymru and celebrate their annual #BlossomWatch campaign alongside our ambassador, Lucy Owen. The National Trust Cymru will be creating a new wellbeing garden at our children's centre later on in the year.

Other notable achievements included raising over £20,000 through the Big Give Christmas Challenge, being awarded a three-year grant from the Masonic Charitable Foundation to help fund our early intervention service 'Better Start, Better Future,' and receiving an extension to our grant from the Neumark Foundation for our speech & language therapy work.

Despite there being less this year, we were thankful for continued opportunities to apply for covid emergency funding through funders such as the Moondance Foundation, the Edward Gosling Foundation, and the Third Sector Resilience Fund, administered by the Wales Council for Voluntary Action. Our success in the previous year with emergency grant applications has meant a particularly high reporting requirement this year.

Although the pandemic has unlocked new avenues of fundraising opportunities for us, such as digital fundraising, some of our key income streams such as events and community fundraising opportunities are still suffering from the effects of the pandemic, and as a result we predict another challenging year ahead as we see the emergency funding opportunities slowly coming to an end.

We continue however to be so grateful to staff, volunteers, supporters, funders, and families who join with us in making sure that we make a difference to as many babies, children and families living with cerebral palsy as possible.

THE WONDERFUL WORLD OF CHARITY RETAIL

Our charity shops play a huge role in our fundraising activity, and prior to the pandemic, they were consistently generating around one third of the charity's total income.

After a second lockdown, our shops were once again able to open their doors on 12th April 2021 following the relaxation of social distancing rules. They slowly increased income to above the levels seen during the depths of the pandemic in 2020/21 and have successfully generated £408,685 in income over the course of the year.

2021-22 also saw the exciting launch in May of our new online charity shop via the platform, Thriftify, and the appointment of an E-commerce Manager. The new venture has been supported by a grant from the Third Sector Resilience Fund, administered by the Wales Council for Voluntary Action.

With a view to increasing our income generation, so we can provide more support to children and families in Wales living with cerebral palsy, we are planning to develop this area of income in the future.





OUR VISION FOR THE FUTURE

As the leading charity in Wales for cerebral palsy, our vision is to provide a better future for every child in Wales who has cerebral palsy.

Cerebral palsy is the most common physical disability in children worldwide. In Wales, approximately every 5 days, a child will be born with or at risk of cerebral palsy. We want to make sure we can be there for every child and family that needs us.

Over the next five years we want to increase our capacity and resources to be able to see more children, of all ages, and their families at each of the critical milestone stages throughout childhood. By supporting our work, you could help us be there for children at every key stage of their childhood - for the first two years after birth, throughout their toddler years, starting primary school, transitioning from infants to juniors, moving to high school, and preparing for their teenage years.

A new children's centre was part of this plan, which we have now achieved. We are also working to create a Cerebral Palsy Register for Wales so that all organisations involved in the care of children with cerebral palsy will be better informed to be able to plan services, treatment, and undertake research for the future.

We know that to achieve all this it will mean growing our income substantially over the next few years. We simply can't do this without your support.




