Dear Friends,

As I write this, we have just had the 500th baby referred to our specialist early intervention service, 'Better Start, Better Future'! To commemorate this significant milestone, this editon of the tangram will focus on all the work we do around early intervention, and the fundraising effort needed to provide this vital service. We are continuing to see an increased demand for our early intervention service, which is fully charitably funded, so we depend heavily on the generosity of supporters like you to make it possible for every baby to be seen. Chester's Story

Chester is one of the 500 babies that has been referred to our specialist early intervention service, 'Better Start, Better Future' since we launched the service at the end of 2015. His parents, Richard and Charlotte, have kindly agreed to share their family's story to demonstrate how a donation made to us this Christmas will have a life-changing impact on the families who access this vital service.

"Chester was born at 27+1 weeks very unexpectedly and was delivered at home by his dad, weighing just 1.18kg. He was rushed straight into the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) and although at first he seemed to be breathing ok on his own, within 24 hours he had stopped breathing which lead to him being resuscitated. This in turn led to a grade 3 and 4 bleed on his brain.



Chester's time in NICU was full of ups and downs and was a rollercoaster of emotions for us. He caught e-coli and had numerous blood transfusions, oxygen ventilation, lumbar punctures and ventricle taps to help drain the excess fluid on his brain.

After 102 days in NICU, Chester arrived home on oxygen. This was a scary time for us both, but our outreach nurse visited every week to help and support us. Each week we saw his oxygen dependency lower and eventually, after 3 months, Chester came off oxygen support altogether. We were first told about Cerebral Palsy Cymru by our consultant Rachel, when we were discussing his coming home plan. Rachel mentioned about the charity's early intervention service 'Better Start, Better Future' that helped babies just like Chester. Once we left hospital, Cerebral Palsy Cymru's family support coordinator, Glenys Evans, contacted us for an initial discussion, and it was only a few weeks later that we were booked in for our first session.

During our first visit, Gosia, one of Cerebral Palsy Cymru's specialist therapists, and Glenys listened to our story and provided us both with much needed support, listening to our worries and concerns. They gave us exercises to help Chester develop based on what our goals as a family were. We felt a sense of relief and positivity coming out of our first session, that we were able to have that support and that the future was not so daunting.



Since that very first therapy session at Cerebral Palsy Cymru, we have seen a huge improvement in Chester's development. When he first started his sessions, he would rarely use his right hand or turn his head to the right. However, thanks to the therapy he has received, Chester is now starting to use both his hands. The knowledge you gain by working alongside Cerebral Palsy Cymru's specialist therapy team helps you understand how the brain works and why certain things may be a challenge for babies like Chester.





The help and support you gain from these therapy sessions are simply incredible. By using what we learn during the sessions at home, we have seen Chester go from strength to strength. He is a very determined little boy, and the early intervention therapy and family support has helped our family so much.

A lot of parents who have premature babies are worried about what the future may hold, and like us they simply want to give their child the best possible help and support.

What is Cerebral Palsy?

Cerebral palsy is an umbrella term that describes a group of conditions affecting a developing infant or child's brain.

How common is it?

It is the most common physical disability in children worldwide. It is estimated that in the UK around 1 in every 400 children will be diagnosed with cerebral palsy. There are around 30,000 children living with cerebral palsy in the UK today.

In Wales, around 70 babies are born every year who will have cerebral palsy and it is estimated that 1,800 children are living with the condition.

Cerebral palsy can be classified in many ways, including by functional ability, distribution, or type of tone.

Paralympian Olivia Breen joins our team as our new Ambassador

Olivia, who was diagnosed with cerebral palsy at the age of two, has represented both Wales and Great Britain in the Commonwealth and Paralympic Games, winning Gold in Birmingham in 2022. She is a passionate and hands-on supporter of Cerebral Palsy Cymru, helping us to raise £22,220 in just seven days as part of our Big Give Christmas Challenge in 2022. Below, Olivia shares with us what it was like growing up with cerebral palsy and why it means so much to her to be an ambassador for Cerebral Palsy Cymru.

I was diagnosed with cerebral palsy (CP) at the age of two, and my parents tell me that the benefits of all the early years of therapy that I received made a massive difference to how I developed. Because having cerebral palsy is a part of who I am it's not something I think of very often - it is what it is! I have a mix of ataxic and athetoid CP which affects my balance and coordination and means that I move all the time.

When I was younger, my parents always encouraged me to try different sports just like my brothers who are also very sporty. I tried swimming, trampolining, dance and horse-riding and they all really helped my symptoms. I loved them all but running was the thing which made me really happy. I always found school really difficult but always loved PE and more practical lessons. Before my first sports day at infants school, my parents were really nervous about how I would get on because at that point I was still falling over all the time. They didn't need to worry though because I won my race and from then on, I knew that running was going to be my thing. I really loved the feeling of winning and being good at something.

The highlight of my career so far has to be the 2022 Commonwealth Games. I was made co-captain of the Welsh Athletics team for the Games and the team was the most special I have ever been on. It felt like family and we all really supported each other. I was the first athlete to compete on the track for Wales and I won. I literally couldn't believe it. To do that in front of a home crowd with all my family and friends around me and after the uncertainty of the COVID19 pandemic was like a dream come true. On top of this I was the first woman to win a gold medal on the track in 32 years. The year was topped off by me becoming BBC Wales Sports Personality of the Year. 2022 was definitely a year of highlights!

At the moment I am on the longlist of athletes who are likely to go to the Paralympic Games next year and I am determined to keep myself as fit and healthy as I possibly can and throw everything at my training.

If you are reading this and are thinking of taking up a sport, I would simply say try it! You never know where it might lead. If you don't like it then try a different sport until you find one you like. It's not just about medals, the health benefits of taking part in sport are immense both physically and mentally.





Growing up trying all different sports made a huge difference to my symptoms and also gave me confidence and focus. It is also really social and helps you to meet people and make friends. I always say take every opportunity which is offered to you. Disability Sport Wales is a great organisation and offers the opportunity to try all sorts of different sports and it's really fun aswell.

I am absolutely thrilled to be an ambassador for Cerebral Palsy Cymru and it was wonderful to visit their children's centre earlier this year to see the great work that they do. They are participating in the Big Give Christmas Challenge in a few weeks time which is an amazing campaign! Whatever donations are made during the campaign are doubled - wow, what a huge difference this could make! I would also urge anyone deciding which charity to support, to choose Cerebral Palsy Cymru. The difference which their therapy can make to babies who have or are suspected of having CP is phenomenal and the ongoing support of the charity to children with cerebral palsy and their families makes all the difference.

Training and education courses at Cerebral Palsy Cymru

At Cerebral Palsy Cymru, we believe that sharing knowledge and skills is essential for the benefit of the children we see. In June and July this year, we hosted our 7th EiSMART Early Intervention & Assessment course at our specialist children's centre in Cardiff, sharing our world-leading expertise in the treatment of cerebral palsy with therapists from UK and Ireland.

Although primarily for therapists to enhance their skills, the EiSMART course also provides families of babies who have, or are at risk of having cerebral palsy, the opportunity to work alongside our expert therapists and the course participants to experience the benefits of intensive early intervention.

The practical sessions of the course are focused and individually tailored to the specific needs of every infant, mainly around promoting and encouraging early interaction, play, infant self-initiated movement, sleep or daily co-occupations such as feeding or dressing.





In the lead up to the practical sessions, our therapists work with local neonatal teams to identify families who will benefit from taking part in the practical sessions, often while they

are still in neonatal care. A number of the babies who have previously been selected to take part in the practical sessions for these courses have consequently either been referred or selfreferred to us to receive specialist therapy through our early intervention programme 'Better Start, Better Future'. Evan was one of these babies who participated in the recent practical sessions and who is currently receiving specialist early intervention therapy at Cerebral Palsy Cymru.

"Our son Evan was born at 26 weeks and unfortunately at 72 hours of life had medical complications relating to the blood supply to his brain which sadly is not uncommon in extremely preterm babies. This resulted in a weakness in Evan's left side of his body," explains Evan's mum, Lauren. "After finding out about Cerebral Palsy Cymru, I self-referred Evan and after an initial consultation, he is now regularly attending their children's centre for specialist early intervention therapy.





The progress of his left-hand side is incredible. Some examples are that he is now able to put both hands on his bottle, not just his right hand. Following the recent Ei SMART course, he is now able to put both feet on his pram bar. He can now also reach out and feel our faces with his left hand too.

The enhancements we've seen in his left-hand side are down to the extremely valuable early intervention techniques we've learned and which we work hard to put into practice at home. There was a time when we couldn't think too much about his future, what he was or wasn't going to be able to do but we are now very optimistic for his future and that is a wonderful feeling." Thirty one occupational therapists and physiotherapists attended the training, which provided an opportunity to develop their skills working with babies and their families in neonatal units and post discharge during the first year of life.

The first part of the course is delivered remotely, enabling professionals from across the UK to participate in the online education and learning seminars, which are delivered by expert guest speakers from the field of early intervention and which incorporate current scientific knowledge and the latest theoretical developments.

The second part of the course, hosted at our children's centre in Cardiff, consists of 3 days of intensive practical sessions. In these sessions, the course participants focus on translating their acquired knowledge into practical skills, working with babies and their families with guidance and support from the course tutors, including Cerebral Palsy Cymru's specialist therapists and Family Support Coordinator.



"It's hugely important for us to share our specialist expertise with colleagues from NHS teams, promoting excellence and best clinical practice for infants at high risk of cerebral palsy," explains Jenny Carroll, our Centre Director and Consultant Physiotherapist.

"Looking to the future, we plan to expand the training we offer to provide a wider range of training options for families as well as clinical professionals at every stage in their career development. Sharing our specialist knowledge and skills with the wider community and NHS teams in this way will help us to develop a new income stream to help fund our free early intervention service 'Better Start, Better Future', as well as meeting our ultimate goal to improve the quality of life of all children in Wales living with cerebral palsy."




What is 'The Tangram'?

Our newsletter is called 'The Tangram' and you might be wondering why!

The Tangram is actually a Chinese geometrical puzzle consisting of a square cut into seven pieces which can be arranged to make various other shapes.



What does this have to do with Cerebral Palsy Cymru we hear you say? Our logo is infact a tangram made into the shape of a heart.



This unique design was chosen for our logo as the different shapes within the tangram represent the individual characteristics that make us who we are - in one singular form they all lock together to make a square but can also be rearranged to create uniquely different shapes and forms. If you look closely, you can see that the triangle at the top of our logo is slightly out of alignment which is a reminder that no-one is ever perfect, and that is ok!

Why not have a go at making your own Tangram Christmas decoration? Follow the instructions on the opposite page to make a fabulously festive creation! **Step 1** - Cut the shapes out (ask an adult to help you!)

Step 2 - Arrange them into a festive pattern! We've provided a Christmas tree example opposite but there are plenty more examples to choose from online.

Step 3 - Stick your shapes onto a white paper plate.

Step 4 - Once dry, use a hole punch to create a hole at the top of the plate and thread some tinsel or ribbon through it.

Step 5 - Hang your tangram Christmas decoration in your home!
